

We had some P7s up for a creative afternoon where they made pavement art in our quad inspired by the artist Kandinsky. Excellent work from our next generation of budding artists,



Music Technology 'On Location' Learning

November saw the National 4, 5 and Higher Music Technology cohort visit Forth Valley College -Stirling to experience and explore the subject at Higher education. The visit began with a tour of the state-of-the-art recording studios, where students used a variety of mixing consoles, microphones and iMacs in the industry standard recording studios. College instructors explained the intricacies of sound manipulation, from layering tracks to fine-tuning effects and offering hands-on demonstrations that completely captivated our young people.







Later, they had the opportunity to experiment with the equipment, record their own samples, and witness how raw sound is transformed into polished recordings before inserting these into short clips from films. The visit concluded with a Q&A session, where students asked about career paths, job opportunities and the future of music technology. By the end of the trip we all left feeling inspired, and the pupils were looking forward to embellishing their existing projects back at school with their newfound knowledge and skills. KHS Library Updates MCR Pathway Joint Partnership Working

Further impactful practice comes from the strong partnership between the library and MCR Pathway Program. \$1 & \$2\$ became CSI Detectives, using their Problem solving and Library Skills to solve an "Easter Murder Mystery". To eliminate fact from fiction \$1 & \$2\$ used clues from searching the online Library Catalogue, scavenged through library stacks & shelves, and looked through books and boxes to arrive at the true facts behind the case, answering the key questions- Who was the victim? Where and What was the murder weapon? and Who was the murderous villain? It was Elementary my dears and our \$1 & \$2\$ solved the case! We can't tell you who did it- That is classified.

The library isn't just about books, the environment and space can inspire stories, boost creativity, wellbeing and learning development. This is exactly what happened when one of our students increased his confidence through being introduced to "The Lord of the Rings" by J.R.R Tolkien as part of the excellent MCR Program which runs every day from the library. Both mentor and student worked together, with the aid of library resources, accessing DVDs, and ICT for access to You Tube, and google to research thematic elements surrounding the story. As a result, our student has developed excellent ICT, research, information and retrieval skills, and has learned about key themes- such as "Making friends and allies" and the "Heroes Journey" which he can apply to his own life journey as a young person. New Book Nook in School waiting area – Developed by our Reading Schools Working Group



Our Reading Schools Working Group identified the opportunity of developing an engaging Book Nook in the reception waiting area of School. Working with Jacqui the Librarian, students planned and developed a business proposal and presented this to our Head Teacher Mrs. Daniels and SMT. They highlighted what important benefits having a Book Nook would have on our visitors and students, and how it would complement an already comfortable, welcoming and engaging area!

Students from the working group commented "We want to give visitors and students the option to read as soon as they arrive, relax with something to read and browse through while waiting. They added "Reading can be a great distraction; it helps you feel great and will offer some escapism in an otherwise busy world!" The working group works with Jacqui to curate collections and displays. The Nook holds Student Reading Lists, reviews, and recommendations, an archive of student artwork, physical books, magazines and QR codes that link to our Digital Library- Eplatform! The team also designed a few logos and catchy slogans which were presented to our Head Teacher Mrs. Daniels. The clear winner was a catchy Comic Book logo! Our SMT team has been on board every step of the way with such kindness and support. From donating a beautiful bookshelf and books, to our Head Teacher having our logo made into a professional sign! Strathclyde University Accelerate Summer School Successes

13 of our \$4/ students have been successful in their applications to undertake the Strathclyde Accelerate Summer School between the 16th and 20th June. Courses range from Law, Business Management and Chemistry to Product Design! Students will take part in tutor led challenges alongside \$4/5 peers from all over Scotland. A massive congratulations to everyone taking part.



Top Up/ Reach Success

21 of our \$5/6 students successfully completed the Glasgow University run Top Up /Reach Programmes (SCQF Level 7) alongside completing a demanding portfolio of school-based subjects. The Top-Up and Reach Programmes are preparation courses for higher education for pupils who are currently applying for, or are considering applying for, Higher Education courses in university or college. The Top-Up Programme helps pupils prepare for Higher Education and equips pupils with the key skills needed for successful study at degree level. Reach Scotland is a national programme, established through support from the Scottish Funding Council, with the overall aim of widening participation to high demand professions including Dentistry, Law, Medicine and Veterinary Medicine.



Both programmes were facilitated by Postgraduate Tutors who delivered online sessions over the course of 6 weeks. Pupils attended a Top Up campus session at the University of Glasgow as a reward for successfully finishing the programme. They experienced a lecture, seminar and student life workshop. To complete the programme, learners required to submit a written piece of work, completed to academic standards. Our successful reach candidates will attend Glasgow University for an immersion week in June 2025 to support their UCAS applications. Massive congratulations to all those who completed the challenge this year.

Modern Languages Department Update A Global Experience


It has been a vibrant and inspiring term in the Modern Languages Department, with pupils taking part in unique and meaningful opportunities to learn new languages and explore global cultures.

Our Discovering Arabic programme came to a memorable close with a live, interactive virtual tour of the heart of Doha. Pupils experienced the sights and sounds of the Qatari capital in real time,



deepening their cultural understanding and bringing their language learning to life. This immersive approach not only boosted their engagement but also developed key skills such as listening comprehension, intercultural communication, and contextual vocabulary use—skills that are vital in learning any language effectively.

3 pupils also completed an eight-week block of Mandarin, during which they explored Chinese language and culture. This programme served as a stepping stone for those who have chosen to pursue Mandarin at National 5 level in S4. The early exposure has given them a head start in understanding the structure, sounds, and cultural nuances of the language, setting them up for success in the senior phase.



We were also proud to be one of only six schools in Scotland delivering Arabic lessons through the prestigious Qatar Foundation International (QFI). Pupils in S1 and S2 thoroughly enjoyed the experience, and their feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. Their enthusiasm and curiosity highlighted the value of early language learning and the power of cultural exchange.

Recently, we had the honour of welcoming QFI colleagues from Washington, DC, and Europe to Kirkintilloch High School. As the only Scottish school selected for their visit, we showcased our approach to the Discovering Arabic programme and shared our model of language learning at the secondary level. It was a fantastic opportunity to connect with international educators and reflect on the progress our pupils have made.



This term has highlighted how language learning goes far beyond the classroom—it opens doors to new perspectives, deeper cultural appreciation, and real-world skills. We are incredibly proud of what our pupils have achieved, and we're excited about the new opportunities coming next. Watch this space!

- Plain white T-shirt
