Early Learning and Childcare Arnprior Pumpkin Farm Trip

After the October break, our Level 5 Skills for Work Early Learning and Childcare class visited Amprior Pumpkin Farm in Stirlingshire as part of their learning on aspects of play.

The trip allowed pupils to consider the benefits of outdoor learning for children in a real-life context, and how this supports the development of social, emotional, cognitive and physical skills.

As well as pumpkin picking, another highlight for many was roasting marshmallows and sampling the delicious food on offer. Back at school, pupils decorated and carved their pumpkins, demonstrating creative aspects of play as well as considering the role



of the adult in facilitating play activities. The pumpkins were then displayed at the \$1 Halloween disco.





Reading Ambassadors

To celebrate Book Week Scotland Miss Baird, Librarian surprised Reading Ambassadors with a special online session featuring acclaimed poet and children's author Nadine Aisha Jassat. The event also welcomed Liam McCallum, Reading Schools Programme Manager, and his colleague Jasmine Ewens.





The Ambassadors engaged in a deep discussion with Nadine, outlining their journey towards Silver Accreditation and their ambition to expand their reach into the local community and families. They proudly shared their recent success of hosting a 'Family Reading for Pleasure' and 'Book Swap' evening in the library mid-November. Nadine applauded the initiative, calling book swaps a powerful way to promote reading saying "Everyone should have a book that they own". She shared her own background, highlighting her mixed heritage and emphasizing how the public library was crucial to her reading journey growing up as books were a luxury her family couldn't always afford. "Being introduced to new worlds, characters and situations through books is what helped me become an author!"

One Ambassador raised a critical point informed by recent National Literacy Trust research: currently only 1 in 3 children and young people (ages 8-18) are reading at home for pleasure. Responding to the challenge, Nadine offered an encouraging perspective: "There's a story for everyone, a character or place we can identify and empathise with. There are so many ways to take in a story! The key is building excitement, talking about stories and getting interested in what others are reading."

The session left the Ambassadors inspired and further equipped to tackle their future Reading School challenges. "Seeing our Reading Ambassadors connect directly with an inspirational female author like Nadine was the perfect celebration of their hard work. Their dedication to achieving Silver Accreditation and reaching out to local families, especially with the success of the book swap, shows their commitment to making reading accessible and exciting for everyone." - Miss Baird, Librarian.



Family Learning Event Family Reading For Pleasure & Book Swap Evening

November saw the first of our community learning, family centred Book Swap and Reading For Pleasure sessions. The Library, English Department and Wellbeing Department were joined by EDC Libraries Children and Young Person Officer, Leslie Tyler.

The Ambassadors were outstanding. They welcomed families to the library and settled them into comfy chairs and bean bags ensuring everyone got a tasty treat and a barista hot chocolate supplied by Jackie Adam our Youth Development Officer.

Highlights of the evening included a book tasting session led by Miss Baird, then Ambassadors guided families through a bookish treasure hunt designed by Leslie from EDC Libraries. The families could then explore our Digital Library E- Platform.



At the end of our evening families swapped their own preloved books, then left with a mystery read to unwrap, enjoy and keep.

The relaxed, cosy atmosphere reminded us how much reading is still loved by families and young people. One exciting outcome was the interest in creating a Parent Book Group—a fantastic way to share recommendations and build a reading community. Watch this space!

Thanks to all who attended. Don't worry if you couldn't make it this time, we will be hosting other evenings in future!








Art Successes & Trip

The \$1 classes have just finished their self portrait unit with some fabulous examples of work across all the classes-well done \$1!



Family Learning Event Clay Modelling





S4 & S6 Edinburgh Zoo Trip

Our visit to Edinburgh Zoo offered a lesson in conservation, biology and ecology. Our young people had the opportunity to participate in themed sessions led by the zoo's education team. Our \$6 biologists even had the opportunity to learn about how to research animal adaptations and behaviour.


By having these hands on experiences, our learners were able to explore and learn about conservation, sparking their curiosity!

We heard from the Trussel Trust Foodbank and Christians Against Poverty to inform pupils about the valuable work of these local charities. Pupils then went on to select and represent a charity, with the chance to win £3000 on their behalf.





Youth and Philanthropy Initiative Final

We hosted the YPI Final with the Emma Cameron Foundation as winners of the £3000 grant. Thanks to the amazing presentation skills of Keira, Lucy and Faryl, a small family-run charity that helps children during cancer treatment, will be able to provide more support to local families. Emma Cameron's godmother was in the audience, which made the moment even sweeter.

All the groups performed amazingly and were a credit to our school. It was the hardest decision ever this year as the calibre was so high.






Live 'n' Learn

We were delighted to welcome Scott and Jen from Live'n'Learn, who delivered an inspiring session on developing an Exam Mindset to our S4 learners. Pupils took part in a range of activities, including creating personalised study timetables and exploring Cloudhopping, a reflective exercise where they identified aspirations for their future.

They also learned how small, consistent improvements known as marginal gains can optimise their study conditions by enhancing everyday habits by just 1%. Areas of focus included sleep, exercise, time spent on devices and water intake, helping our pupils recognise how simple changes can make a big difference.

The session concluded with S4's writing feedback on a postcard, examples of which are shown above. Our S4 pupils were highly engaged throughout the session and gave excellent feedback on their learning.








Study Hub & Wider Achievement Update

The Wider Achievement section highlights pupil involvement across year groups and houses, with examples of activities ranging from creative workshops to cultural trips and competitions.








Attainment Mentoring

In October, we launched our Attainment Mentoring sessions, pairing \$4 pupils with \$6 volunteers for weekly subject-focused support in the Study Hub. These sessions provided valuable opportunities for collaboration, with \$6 leaders helping their younger peers to identify and discuss key learning points, work through past paper questions together, and explore how to use Achieve effectively for independent study. The next phase of Attainment Mentoring is already in preparation and will begin in February. Feedback from both mentors and mentees has highlighted



significant improvements in confidence and study skills, and we are excited to build on this success in the upcoming round.







Sharing Your Child's Successes & Achievements

To ensure successes are celebrated, we have made it easier for families to share achievements from home. In order to track these, the QR code and link shown allows you to share any extracurricular achievements and engagements your child(ren) participates in outside of the classroom. These can include anything from sports club participation, music grades, volunteer work, awards, special projects, or any other involvement that demonstrates their talent, effort, and commitment in the wider community. Your input is invaluable in ensuring that every student's accomplishments are recognised!





Digital Learning Audit

A wide scale evaluation of staff digital skills, and how we use digital tools to teach, took place earlier this session. A large number of the team responded to the audit with the vast majority of the teachers reporting that they are very or extremely confident to use digital learning in their classrooms. Staff are confident in using different pieces of hardware as well as utilising varied software and applications to enhance the more traditional methods of education. Colleagues were able to share with us any barriers they have to using technology as well as being able to identify further training that they would benefit from. Barriers have been shared with the local authority and inhouse learning has begun to support us to learn how to use different applications.

Pupil Parliament

This term, our Pupil Parliament has been working with real purpose and enthusiasm, focusing on one of the school's key priorities: Learning and Teaching. From the very beginning of the year, our representatives have shown maturity, teamwork and a genuine desire to improve the learning experience for all pupils.

The Pupil Parliament meets once a month, and each meeting is led by our \$6 Captaincy Team, who have shown outstanding commitment and professionalism. Their ability to guide discussions, encourage participation and model positive leadership has been invaluable. A heartfelt thank you to our Captains for their excellent leadership and for being such positive role models for our younger pupils.





Over the past few weeks, members of the Pupil Parliament have also been trained in how to lead effective Pupil Focus Groups. Through this training, they have developed skills in active listening, discussion leadership and gathering meaningful feedback from their peers. After Christmas, they will begin leading these focus groups across year groups—giving all pupils a stronger voice in shaping how learning looks and feels in our school.

One significant development that came directly from Pupil Parliament feedback is the introduction of our weekly Pupil Bulletin, now read during Period 1 every Monday. Pupils told us they wanted clearer, more consistent updates about opportunities, clubs, events and achievements. The bulletin has already helped strengthen communication across the school, ensuring everyone starts the week informed and included.

This work connects deeply with the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), particularly:

- Article 12 Respect for the views of the child: Pupils are given a real and meaningful say in decisions that affect them.
- Article 29 Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities: By shaping learning and creating opportunities for leadership, our Pupil Parliament helps promote a positive, engaging learning environment for all.



A special thank you to Mr Pexton for his dedicated leadership of the Pupil Parliament this term. His guidance, encouragement and commitment have supported our young people to grow in confidence and make a genuine impact across the school. We are incredibly proud of our Pupil Parliament and the leadership they have shown this term.
